Help Improve Our Neighborhood

Dear Field Regina Northrop Neighbor:

We as a neighborhood have the opportunity to plan the next 15 years of neighborhood improvement projects under Phase 2 of the Minneapolis Neighborhood Revitalization Program (NRP). The NRP has given us the money to do the year-long planning which started last February. Now it is up to us, as residents and business/property owners, to decide what we want done in the neighborhood.

If you can participate even one hour each month in meetings of any of the following task forces which are planning future neighborhood projects, you would be doing your neighborhood a great service:

- Business Task Force
- Communications Task Force (within the community)
- Community & Safety Task Force
- Education Task Force
- Housing Task Force
- Parks Task Force

During Phase 1 of NRP (1993–present), we were very successful in improving the Field Regina Northrop Neighborhood. Our neighborhood spent nearly \$2.7 million to fund: over \$1.3 million in low-interest home-improvement loans and grants, nearly \$420,000 for development of the Northrop School and McRae Park playgrounds and window replacement at Field School, over \$76,000 for publication and mailing of the *Close to Home* neighborhood newsletter, over \$150,000 in commercial streetscaping at 48th & Chicago and small grants for exterior improvements, nearly \$200,000 to remove a blighted and crime-ridden commercial building and over 8,000 in financial support to the Nokomis Healthy Senior Program Senior Helpline, and

over \$230,000 to fund the FRNNG neighborhood office and paid staff for administration, program implementation, recruitment of volunteers and new block leaders, and the organizing of annual events.

11th Ward News

The financial pressures the City faces in the next 10 years are considerable. Between pension obligations for our public employees and the increase in the cost of health insurance benefits alone, the budget for 2003 would need to grow by \$30.4 million. To respond to these pressures, the City Council and the Mayor have stepped up work on transitioning the City to long-term, holistic financial decision-making.

In prior years, the City made choices to fund park and library operations at a greater level in order to improve these services. Since 1994, property taxes and state aids have grown by 60 percent for the Park Board, and by 42 percent for the Library Board. (This does not count the voter-approved library referendum.) Finding efficiencies in major services funded by the property tax—police, fire, and public works—is getting more and more difficult.

To fund all that the City does and pay off the debts accumulated over the last several years, it is estimated that the property tax revenues collected by the City would have to triple by 2010. This is not acceptable.

I supported a resolution which limits the levy increase to 8 percent for next

year—4 percent to cover the increases in pension obligations, health insurance and other costs—and 4 percent for debt retirement. This resolution recognizes that the City and the Independent Boards operate from the same checkbook and allows all those affected to see up front what they will have to work with next year.

The Mayor recently presented his recommendations for the budget to the City Council. The \$1.22 billion budget represents a 1.7 percent decrease from the 2002 adopted budget and is based on budget principles to secure the City's long-term financial health while protecting core-service delivery.

The proposal includes cuts of about \$5.5 million in the City's 2003 budget, including \$2.1 million from the Police Department, about \$700,000 from Public Works and \$582,000 from the Fire Department. Part of this cut includes removal of Ladder Truck 8 in fire station 27 on Nicollet and 54th. It is expected that the budget will receive final approval in December.

Low-Interest Home Improvement Loans Available

The Field Regina Northrop Neighborhood (FRNN) Group has low-interest 6 percent loans available to fix up your home! You may borrow up to \$25,000 at the 6 percent interest rate if your household income is less than \$88,000. Even better, you may qualify for 5 percent interest if your income is less than \$35,000. Most improvement projects—roof, furnace, windows/doors, insulation—are eligible.

A Home Energy Loan, also available from Community Revitalization Resources (CRR) has no income limits; the maximum loan amount is \$10,000. Loans are available at 6.5 percent interest for energy-related improvements such as furnace, insulation, windows, doors and water heaters.

FRNN has hired CRR, a local non-profit organization, to administer this program. CRR will assist you through the application process and help with any questions you have regarding the program or your improvement projects. 
