## Speak Out to Maintain Neighborhood Control of Projects and Funding!

urrently, Minneapolis residents are in the middle of one of the most important struggles in recent memory. Due to a state law change on corporate tax rates in 2001, the funding source for NRP, a unique and internationally recognized neighborhood improvement and empowerment program, was severely cut. Since then, NRP, the City and neighborhoods have been looking for other sources of funding to continue NRP. On January 14, residents from over 35 Minneapolis neighborhoods met to fashion a resolution supporting continuation of NRP and its funding. They urged that \$11 million from a total \$33 million City Community Development Fund be set aside by the City Council for NRP and the neighborhoods. To date, the NRP has provided nearly \$3 million to your local neighborhood association, the Field Regina Northrop Neighborhood Group (FRNNG).

Since 1993, NRP funding has made it possible for FRNNG to successfully improve the livability of Field Regina Northrop Neighborhood and greatly increase citizen participation. Due to funds provided by the NRP, FRNNG has been able to implement:

- Low-interest home improvement loans and grants (\$1.8 million)
- Development of Northrop School and McRae Park play grounds and window replacement at Field Middle School (\$415,000)
- Funding of the FRNNG neighborhood office, staff, program implementation, annual events, recruitment of volunteers and new block leaders (\$230,000)
- Removal of a blighted and crime ridden commercial building (\$186,000)

- Close to Home newsletter: Private funding from subscriptions and sponsorships continues to grow. Now at 63% of costs, but need it higher.
- New FRN Neighborhood Directory: Homebased business submissions continue to come in for the new directory. Committee working out funding for production.

### Housing Committee/Phase 2 Task Force

Creating a safe and healthy environment for all FRN residents by developing housing strategies to rehabilitate existing housing stock and affordable rental housing, promote the racial, cultural and ethnic diversity of the FRN Neighborhood and create opportunities for older home-owners to remain here despite changing circumstances.

- Home Improvement Loan Program: Recommended to the FRNNG Board to using \$50,000 for this year's low interest loan program to provide loans as low as 5% and an additional \$4,500 for marketing.
- Project for Pride and Living (PPL) House: Groundbreaking ceremony will be scheduled for this June for the PPL home at 4515 - 5th Avenue. Hope to sell by December 2003.

Additionally, he has helped to move the FRNNG association to higher levels of organization and structure. Tom and his wife Cassie are moving to Rosemount and we wish them all the best in the years ahead.

brings new energy and passion to the board. Rod and his wife Pam and their daughter Kelcy have lived in the neighborhood since 1999. ## Ward 11 Update

#### New Airport Noise Exposure Map Released

The Metropolitan Airports
Commission (MAC) recently
released a draft of a new Noise
Exposure Map (NEM). The
NEM will be used to determine
which homes are eligible for the
ongoing Sound Insulation
Program. The new map, with
the sound contours is available
on my website www.ci.minneapolis. mn.us/council/ward11

There are numerous problems with the new map and the assumptions used to create it. For example, the MAC assumes a 38% runway use of the new north/south runway. This means that more homes in Bloomington are included in the 60 DNL and less from Minneapolis. It is unlikely that this many flights will be using that runway. The MAC has a track record of reducing the area eligible for sound insulation in Minneapolis by projecting use of the crosswind runway in the 1996 projections, which use never materialized. The MAC stopped insulating Bloomington homes affected by the crosswind runway arguing that the projected traffic never occurred but it refused to expand the number of

homes in Minneapolis which were subjected to increased noise.



Additionally, the MAC's projections assume a similar reduction in the number of hush-kitted aircraft as has happened over the last few years. During that time, Northwest eliminated use of the very noisy 727's. The noise equivalent of the 727 in the current Northwest fleet is the DC-9. Northwest recently spent a large amount of money to refurbish all their DC-9's so it seems highly unlikely that they are now going to retire them soon.

The MAC's assumptions also contain a very minimal increase in night flights. In order to obtain the total number of flights assumed per day, the number of night flights will need to increase considerably more than is currently being projected.

Council Member Benson disputed several other assumptions in the formula, but this gives you an idea of the basis for the city's objections.

The MAC has committed to spend \$150 million for sound insulation out to the 60DNL, but that amount likely will not be enough to do the full sound insulation package to all the homes in that area. Airport users continue to oppose this level of funding.

# At March Meeting, Executive Committee Approved
