2004 Parade and Family Fun Day on June 5


- South on Chicago to 48th Street,


Welcome Back Spring as an FRNNG Volunteer!

Neighborhood Safety Tip

Neighborhood safety specialists suggest that you be aware of what's going on in your neighborhood in terms of three different zones.

The Blue Zone is your entire street. You can't always know what's going on at the other end or several houses away from our own, but you still can keep a "watchful" eye out and, if something looks suspicious, call the

closest neighbor and alert him or her.

The Yellow Zone is that area closest to your own property (your side neighbors and those across the alley). Get to know what cars your neighbors have parked on the street. Be aware if there's a strange vehicle that hasn't moved in 48 hours; it might have been stolen and dumped on your block. If you see trash on the boulevard, pick it up—a clean block shows someone cares and is possibly "watching."

The Red Zone is the space in front and back of your property. Anytime someone comes into this zone, you

should take notice.

Report any suspicious activity. If you don't feel comfortable calling the police, then contact your SAFE TEAM member.



Online Police Reporting Now Available

There are many times when it is not necessary for a police officer to respond, but a police report needs to be done so that the precinct is aware of what is going on in an area. Now, Minneapolis residents can get on their computers and file a police report on-line. Residents can file reports on-line for:

graffiti damage to property,

- damage or theft from a motor vehicle if there is no suspect information available, and
- cases of theft where property has been stolen, but no unauthorized entry was involved.

Residents cannot file on-line if someone was injured as a result of the crime, you have suspect information or an officer should be dispatched to the crime location.

To make a report on-line, log on to www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us/police/e-report.

The on-line police Web site is monitored 24 hours a day, but if you need a police officer, call 9-1-1.



Northrop School Update

Mot much has changed since the Minneapolis School Board decided to postpone its decision on school closings until this fall. The promised meetings with concerned parents and residents have not yet been scheduled, due largely to a decision by the Board to hire facilitators to structure and lead this process. At the last Parent Advisory Board meeting potential facilitators were presented, but at press time we have no word on whether the Board has hired anyone for this position.

Within the school community, parents recently completed a questionnaire to help our Parent Advisory Board representatives have a clearer idea of what our parents value or would change about Northrop School and, more broadly, the Minneapolis Public School system. Overwhelmingly, parents are excited about the diversity inherent in urban public schools, Northrop's small size and the quality of instruction delivered there.

We would encourage those wishing to communicate their ideas about the future of Minneapolis Public Schools to remain active in this process. The Minneapolis Public School Web site (www.mpls.k12.mn.us) can provide residents with useful contact information for legislators as well as Board members. The "Board of Education" and "Legislative Agenda" links are particularly helpful. In lieu of computer access, the School Board Office number is 668-0197.


Grand Excursion 2004 Celebrates Upper Mississippi River

The Grand Excursion of 2004 celebrates the renaissance of the upper Mississippi River region by recreating the 1854 train and steamboat expedition that brought worldwide attention to what was then America's wild, western frontier. During the Grand Excursion 2004 Flotilla, communities all along a 400-mile stretch of the Mississippi River—from the Quad Cities of Iowa and Illinois through the bluffs of Wisconsin, to the Twin Cities of Minnesota—will host celebrations; and recreational, educational and cultural events.

You can enjoy the Grand Excursion on a boat, a train or a bike. The largest paddle wheeler and riverboat flotilla in over a century will retrace the original Grand Excursion's history-making journey, with harbor, day and overnight cruises at ports all along the route. The flotilla will start in the Quad Cities the last weekend in June and end in the Twin Cities on the July 4th weekend. The Milwaukee Road 261, an authentic, restored steam locomotive, will offer trips from Chicago to Rock Island and between communities all along the flotilla route. A 400-mile bike ride will cover between 35 and 70 miles each day, riding alongside the bluffs of the upper Mississippi region.

You also may participate in local activities in Minneapolis and St. Paul on the July 3–5 weekend. Minneapolis will showcase the Grand Excursion "Gathering at the Falls" as part of its overall July 4 festivities, which will include a parade, music, children's carnival, displays, tours and fireworks.

Ward 8 Update

The Sears Development— Midtown Exchange Update

The Eighth Ward is home to the second largest building in the state. The former Sears building is

second only to the Mall of America in square footage. Many of us remember when Sears was an important and bustling retail center. With all the other exciting things happening along East Lake Street, the largest and most influential building along this corridor soon will be seeing new life. We have all been looking at the dark and vacant building at the corner of Chicago and Lake for too long. Now things there will change and change quickly.

At the first of the year, after a proposal process with unprecedented citizen review and involvement, the City Council selected the Ryan Companies US, Inc. as the preferred developer for the site. The first six months of this year are dedicated to working with Ryan and their partners to create the terms for the development. I have been working very hands-on on this project. I want to see it thrive. Also, I want to make sure there are ample opportunities for the local community to be involved in the project—both in shaping it and in benefiting from business and work opportunities throughout construction and when it opens.

The development will be called the Midtown Exchange and will include a global food market, office and other commercial space, housing (senior rental, other rental and for-sale), a separate hotel, a parking ramp and other uses. Project for Pride in Living will be partnering to build for-sale townhomes at 29th Street and 10th Avenue as part of the project. There will be some 2,000 jobs created in what is the fastest growth corridor in the state.

The big news is that the Allina Board of Directors recently voted to locate their corporate headquarters at the Midtown Exchange! Allina will relocate about 1,000 jobs there. They will be consolidating operations from several different locations throughout the metro area. This is great news! It brings a high level of certainty to the project.

Minneapolis City staff and Ryan staff are working very quickly to get this project going. We will be finalizing construction contracts by midyear. Ryan hopes to start construction this summer with planned occupancy of the building in the Spring of 2006.
