Revised 2009 budget makes Public Safety and Public Works top priorities

On Monday, Feb. 23rd, Mayor R.T. Rybak presented his proposal for a new 2009 City budget. The City is being forced to revise its budget because Governor Tim Pawlenty cut \$13.1 million in funding to Minneapolis at the end of 2008 and is now proposing another \$35 million in permanent cuts through 2010.

The proposed budget, which will be considered by the City Council, includes cuts to every City department. While every effort was made to reduce job losses, the magnitude of the needed cuts means that staff reductions are unavoidable.

If allocated equally across the city, the Governor's proposed cuts to Minneapolis for this year would have led to the elimination of 161 jobs, including 57 sworn officer positions and 19 civilian positions in the police department and 27 firefighter positions. However, Federal Stimulus money, a reduced City debt, and cuts in City services will limit these job cuts to 59. About half of those cuts are in management, and 26 of the 59 eliminated positions are currently vacant. Also, the proposed budget does not call for layoffs in the police or fire departments, although six vacant fire department positions will not be filled.

The Mayor's proposal would eliminate the Civil Rights Complaint

Investigations Unit and the City's Health Lab. Both are services that the State or other jurisdictions are already providing.

This budget proposal was prepared after having many discussions with City leaders, employees and residents at budget forums or from ideas and feedback sent via e-mail, Web survey, or suggestion box. That process generated many ideas for cost savings and efficiencies that City leaders will consider as they prepare the 2010 City budget, which is likely to require even more significant cuts.

The City Council will consider the Mayor's proposal over the next two weeks, and is expected to vote on a final 2009 budget in early March.

- Your monthly income must not exceed \$1735 per month (for one person in the home) or \$2335 (for two people in the home).

Cedar Avenue United Aims to Tame Traffic on a Heavily Used Corridor

Cedar Avenue United (CAU), founded last Fall by Northrop resident Will Peterson, is working to make Cedar Avenue safer and more livable for the residents of the several Minneapolis neighborhoods that adjoin it. They have been meeting with representatives from Hennepin County Commissioner Peter McLaughlin's office, 11th Ward Council Member Scott Benson, and various business owners and residents of neighborhoods that line Cedar Avenue.

Cedar is a main artery into and out of downtown from the Crosstown and 494 Highways. It defines the eastern border of Northrop neighborhood. According to Access Minneapolis, (the City of Minneapolis' 10-year transportation plan), between Franklin Avenue and the Crosstown Highway, Cedar Avenue contains 5 dangerous intersections, each with at least 10 accidents per year; 14 blocks of over-capacity traffic

volume (the only such roadway in South Minneapolis east of 35W); 2 bridges with a sufficiency rating less than 60 spanning the Midtown Greenway and Lake Nokomis; and 14 blocks of "poor" or "fair" road surface.

The group hopes to garner support and ideas from local businesses to help address their limited parking issues, and attract foot and bike traffic. They would like to develop "neighborhood identities" around the several business nodes that line Cedar, using simple visual cues such as banners, benches, landscaping and markers, to engage local residents and catch the attention of passing traffic – slowing it down.

CAU is looking for help from local residents, as well. The din of Cedar Avenue's traffic far surpasses airport noise levels on many blocks lining the avenue. Their goals are to make it easier and more pleasant to walk and bike along Cedar Avenue, to access the several

parks that border it, and to safely cross between the east and west sides of the street.

The group is exploring ideas as simple as placing speed limit signs in areas at issue; stricter and more frequent enforcement of existing speed limits; and painting road lines identifying parking, crosswalks and turn lanes. More involved, long-term plans, such as creating protected parking areas, center medians and curb bump outs; replacing and improving pavements for multimodal transportation; and incorporating aspects of the Complete Streets model, are being explored as well.

Right now, CAU is developing their game plan to accomplish all this. They are looking for ideas and support from residents and business owners. Anyone who may be interested is welcome to their monthly meetings (Sibley Park, 1st Wednesdays of the month, 6:30 pm). Their website is:

Field Regina Northrup Neighborhood Group is cleaning up the area around Minnehaha Parkway and 11th Ave. No pre-registration is required. The site has a registration table where gloves, bags and directions are provided.

What is Earth Day?

Earth Day is a collaborative effort between the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) and City of Minneapolis Solid Waste and Recycling. The Minneapolis Earth Day Watershed Clean Up was initiated in 1995 to draw attention to the water quality improvement needs of Minneapolis' lakes and the effects that individual actions have on urban water quality. The goal of Earth Day is to provide both a volunteer experience and environmental education to Minneapolis residents and park users who participate in the event.

This annual event involves cleaning major watersheds and water bodies in the City of Minneapolis including: the Chain of Lakes, Lake Nokomis, Lake Hiawatha, Powderhorn Lake, Diamond Lake, Shingle Creek, Minnehaha Creek, Bassett's Creek and the Mississippi River. In 2008 over 2,800 people removed more than 22,500 pounds of garbage at 25 cleanup locations around Minneapolis.
