What/Who is FRNNG?

FRNNG is the Field Regina Northrop Neighborhood Group. We are the recognized neighborhood organization for three neighborhoods in south Minneapolis: Field,



Regina and Northrop. FRNNG plays a vital role in managing funds pledged to Minneapolis neighborhoods through NRP and now, CPP. We facilitate grants that are available to residents and raise funds to improve and protect our neighborhoods.

History

The area now called Field Regina Northrop (FRN) Neighborhood was part of the first land acquired by the United States in what eventually became Minnesota. In the 1920's the area was still mainly rural but there were two main commercial districts in FRN - one at 48th and Chicago and the other at 48th and Fourth Avenue – and both were classic examples of the "streetcar corner" that grew up at regular nodes along streetcar lines. In 1975, the South Chicago Avenue Business Alliance was formed to guide the future of 48th and Chicago and the organization has been

11th Ward Update

Dear Neighbors,

The beginning of the year is a great time to take a look forward at some of the things that will be happening in FRN this year.

As part of a citywide bike infrastructure plan, 17th Avenue will have improvements made to it that should make it better for commuting by bike. Between 24th Street and Minnehaha Parkway, 17th will become a bicycle boulevard. Public Works will use signage, pavement markings and traffic calming to encourage more bicycles to use 17th, while discouraging drivers from using 17th as a commuter route. I'm continuing to work with officials from Minneapolis Public Schools and developers to figure out viable development options for Northrop School. The plan that was presented turned out to not be

financially viable or sustainable. I've connected the school officials with city staff who have expertise in land development and valuation. I'm confident that thorough some of these conversations, we will be able to develop a plan that is a win-win-win for the neighborhood, school board and developer.

The 2012-2016 Capital Longrange Improvement Plan includes \$225,000 for Athletic Field and Site Improvements at McRae Park. These improvements will be done this summer. The Park Board is finalizing the plans for exactly what this will entail, but I'm looking forward to seeing the improvements!

FRNNG Grant Sheds Light on Neighborhood Crime

A little light was shed on crime for some residents in the Regina neighborhood when FRNNG was able to provide grant money towards the purchase of motion-detector lights for their homes and garages, following a string of break-ins late last fall. Assisted by FRNNG's 3rd Precinct Crime Prevention Specialist, FRNNG's Community and Safety committee was able to hire South Side Electric of Bloomington to install the security lights. Research and crime statistics prove that well-lighted properties are less likely to be burglarized than darkened ones.



Gardening Tips- Getting a Start on Your Vegetable Garden

It may look bleak outside, but now is the perfect time to think about what to plant in your vegetable garden. Start with a list of vegetables and herbs you want to try — I like to try at least one new thing every year, and planting a variety can help ensure at least a couple of successes. Draw your garden on graph paper and make sure you have enough space.

March and early April are the ideal time to start seeds indoors. I have a very small seed-starting system on top of my refrigerator where it's warm, and because it's in a prominent location, it's easier to remember to water and/or mist them twice daily.

If you're new to seed starting it helps to have a strategy. This year, I'm going to focus on greens such as lettuces, chard, and kale. My plan is to get transplants out in the garden as soon as possible in mid-April and hopefully be enjoying lettuce and greens in late May. If you direct-seed greens in the garden, you may not have any harvest before mid-June. It helps to have realistic expectations about these things.

Not long after I plant out the baby spring lettuces and greens, I will start another round of seeds inside so that I'll have transplants ready when the first are done in July. This way I can assure a good

Restorative Justice- Bringing People Together to Make Things Right

Restorative justice is a victim centered response to crime that provides opportunities by those most affected by the crime- the victim, the offender and members of the community to be directly involved in responding to the harm caused by the crime. At Restorative Justice Community Action (RJCA) our goal is restorative justice, which means the outcome should repair whatever damage was done to the extent possible. We use a face-to-face model called "community conferencing," which is very different from the traditional court process. The conference itself is a guided small group discussion with a focus on two things: how people are affected by certain activities and how

to repair the harm. A conference can deal with up to 4 separate cases in 2 to 3 hours. This is not about shaming or punishment. It is meant to produce a positive outcome through personal responsibility and the opportunity to make amends. The program exists because people from local neighborhoods are working together to improve the quality of life in their community.

At RJCA we get a lot of referred participants who are cited for livability crimes which many people consider victimless crimes since there is no clear cut victim. In these instances we see the community as a victim. Restorative justice improves accountability through consequences that are more significant

to the offender and community than traditional punishments administered by the punitive system. Through the community conferencing process, community members get to know their neighbors and go on to join other neighborhood activities: neighborhood board, block patrol, clean-up event, etc. Each offender meets face-to-face with community members, admits responsibility and learns first-hand how their actions have affected others.

Grants Available for Water-friendly Landscaping

Want to help protect clean water as you plan to beautify your yard this spring? The Minnehaha Creek Watershed

District (MCWD) can help. The MCWD offers grants for projects that protect water resources in a variety of ways, whether or not you live on a lake or stream.


Polluted stormwater runoff is the biggest water quality problem in Minnesota and across the country. In a natural environment, most rainwater soaks into the ground or is captured by trees or other plants. But in developed areas, rainwater runs off roads, parking lots and rooftops, carrying dirt, fertilizer, pesticides and other harmful material into lakes, streams and wetlands. Eroded shorelines and streambanks also contribute sediments and excess nutrients to waterways. The poor water quality that results affects recreation, fish and wildlife, and reduces property values near affected lakes and streams.

The MCWD encourages using stormwater best management practices (BMPs) that catch polluted stormwater

before it enters sewers or water bodies. The District is also ready to pay for up to half of the cost and help you plan what's best for you.

Eligible projects for the Stormwater BMP Cost Share grant funding include raingardens (planted depressions that filter stormwater), pervious pavers (hard surfaces which allow water to pass through), and other innovative BMPs that capture and filter stormwater.

Eligible projects for the Shoreline and Streambank Stabilization Cost Share grant funding use native plants to reduce erosion along lakes and streams. The roots of native plants anchor the soil, filter and absorb polluted runoff, and beautify the shoreline or streambank. Their natural height and density



also discourage geese, which are attracted to turf adjacent to water.

"There are many options people can take to enhance their property and help the environment at the same time," Joe Barten, MCWD's Cost Share Specialist, esaid. "Cost Share grants can cover up to 50 percent of a project's cost and we encourage property owners to take advantage of the program."

Grants are available for improvements to private property including residential, business and private schools. Shoreline and Streambank Cost Share grants also are available to public entities.
